

KHA's Capitol Comments March 10, 2023

Joint Rules and Regulations Committee Meets

Today, the Joint Rules and Regulations Committee, chaired by Senator Kellie Warren (R-Leawood), heard from Cody Bebout, assistant general counsel, Kansas State Board of Healing Arts, on a proposed change to K.A.R. 100-15-1, and Christine Osterland, Kansas Department of Health and Environment, on a proposed change to KAR-129-6-88.

Bebout highlighted one change in K.A.R. 100-15-1. K.A.R. 100-15-1 allows a resident with an active license to have a second job for more hours and experience and sets the expiration date annually for June 30 each year. Following questions, the committee expressed no concerns.

Osterland discussed the proposed change to the working healthy program in KAR-129-6-88. KAR-129-6-88 changes premiums to be charged to Medicaid consumers participating in the program. Currently, a premium is imposed upon a Working Healthy consumer when the consumer's household income exceeds 100 percent of the federal poverty-level income. The proposed change raises the floor for imposing a premium to 266 percent of poverty-level income. For 2022, the federal poverty-level income for a single person was \$13,590. Committee members expressed concern this needs to go through legislation and suggested it is a back-door avenue to Medicaid expansion. The committee also took issue with this as an appropriations item.

Senate Federal and State Affairs Committee Hears Bill on Philanthropic Gifts

Today, the Senate Federal and State Affairs Committee, chaired by Senator Mike Thompson (R-Bonner Springs), held a hearing on <u>Senate Bill 133</u>. The legislation provides for the enforcement of donor-imposed restrictions on philanthropic gifts of endowment funds or property to charitable organizations.

The bill heard from the following proponents:

- Megan Schmidt, Philanthropy Roundtable, family foundations network
- Mark Hutton, Benefactor and former legislator

The committee also heard from opponent Gregg Willems, from Kansas State University Foundation who expressed concern it could be a significant drain on charitable organizations' focus and resources, as well as conflicts with existing law. Further, Willems suggested:

- The bill doesn't define the legal representative of a single donor
- Doesn't address when there are multiple donors
- Highlights the donor intent can be difficult to interpret
- Concerns around transfer allowances
