President's Perspective – KHA Board Convenes During Convention

Prior to the start of the KHA Annual Convention and Trade Show, the Kansas Hospital Association Board of Directors met, in person, to discuss several emerging and pertinent topics facing Kansas hospitals, including health care workforce. To kick off the meeting, the KHA Board had the opportunity to hear from David Ninan, DO, from the Kansas College of Osteopathic Medicine in Wichita. Dr. Ninan, who serves as the dean and chief academic officer, recapped the history of KCOM and highlighted its commitment to increasing the number of physicians practicing in Kansas. KCOM's inaugural medical student class consisted of 90 students who are expected to be practicing by June 2029. The KHA Board also heard about recent workforce initiatives revolving around health care apprenticeship opportunities and additional health care career awareness programs.

A state and federal advocacy update was provided to the KHA Board touching upon those policy issues most relevant to Kansas hospitals. On the federal level, Congress continues to wrestle with several outstanding topics including the federal budget, site-neutral payment, Medicaid disproportionate share and the 340B Drug Discount Program. The KHA Board also discussed the difficulties and confusion caused by the Medicare Advantage program. KHA encourages continued involvement by the membership in our federal advocacy efforts as we continue to educate our Kansas Congressional Delegation on these important programs.

On the state level, the KHA Board had an opportunity to hear a preview of the upcoming 2024 Kansas legislative session and potential topics that may be considered. KHA's advocacy initiatives largely revolve around growing the health care workforce, improving health care reimbursement and eliminating administrative burdens. KHA members will have the opportunity to engage with their elected officials later this year during the upcoming legislative dinners. These events will begin on Oct. 11 in Salina.

• Welcomed David McCorkle, CEO, of Citizens Health, Colby, to the KHA Board of Directors.

- Recognized KHA staff member, Tom Hagen, as the new KHA director of corporate relations.
- Approved the KHA membership applications for Minimally Invasive Surgery Hospital, Community Care Hospice and JustAskEvie.
- Approved modifications to the KHA Bylaws, including allowing rural emergency hospitals to be eligible for membership as a community hospital.
- Adopted the KHA finance and investment report.
- Recapped the results of the public opinion poll and identified potential public campaign strategies.
- Highlighted the latest activities surrounding the KHA Strategic Aim to "improve Kansas' statewide health ranking, with a focus on preventative health services."
- Discussed the status update on the Rural Emergency Hospital program, including the recent proposed regulations.
- Provided a status update on the fundraising progress of the <u>KHA Political Action</u> <u>Committee</u>.

Workers Protection Toolkit Is Now Available

During the 2023 session, the Kansas Legislature passed <u>Senate Bill 174</u>, which went into effect in July, increasing the penalties around assault and battery of a health care worker. With the new change in statute, the Kansas Hospital Association has put together a toolkit you can personalize with your hospital logo and create resources for those coming into your hospital or resources for your staff.

The toolkit has a series of eight posters to be used in your facilities to raise awareness about the increased penalties for acts of violence against health care workers. <u>Instructions and links to posters</u> for public and employee spaces are now available to KHA members.

Additional resources in our member toolkit include a <u>template media release</u> on the new law, a <u>health care crimes list</u>, including statutes, and a <u>document for planning for and reporting a</u> <u>crime</u>.

Reimbursement Form for Involuntary Patient Holds Now Available

Last session, the Kansas Hospital Association worked with the Kansas Legislature to pass a program allowing for reimbursement to hospitals for the round-the-clock patient observation and the transportation costs of involuntary admission patients to state hospitals. The Kansas Department for Aging and Disabilities made the forms for reimbursement available this week. The form can be found by visiting <u>KDADS Form for Involuntary Patients</u>. You may view the website and get all the information by visiting <u>State Hospitals (ks.gov)</u>.

Hospitals seeking reimbursement will need to be registered as a vendor in the state's SMART accounting system. To become enrolled, you must fill out the <u>DA-130</u> and <u>W-9 form</u> for payment.

Ensuring Patient Coverage during Medicaid Unwinding

Some Kansas hospitals have reported seeing an increase in uninsured patients in the emergency room. Hospitals still play a crucial role in Medicaid Unwinding by supporting and assisting patients in getting coverage. Here are two ways the Cover Kansas project can support Kansas hospitals in this process:

Educating Patients:

One of the primary ways hospitals can assist patients is by providing comprehensive, up-to-date information about the changes in KanCare coverage. Hospitals can offer educational workshops, online resources and printed materials to help patients understand the shifting landscape of Medicaid eligibility criteria and available alternatives.

- Bookmark the <u>KanCare Renewals Dashboard</u> for printable resources in up to 15 languages, FAQs from KanCare and social media toolkits to help keep patients informed.
- Follow <u>Cover Kansas</u> for easily sharable posts.
- Find <u>up-to-date information</u> (by county and age) on how many individuals have been approved, discontinued and are in the "90-day window."

Assisting with Enrollment:

As patients become ineligible for KanCare, hospitals can assist in navigating the enrollment process for other coverage options. If a patient loses Medicaid and is interested in applying for Affordable Care Act coverage, Cover Kansas Marketplace Navigators can assist with applications or answer questions at no cost.

Understanding the data submission and editing process facilitates improvement in the quality of the data; thus, improving the quality of the KHA hospital reports.

COVID-19 Vaccine and Testing Update

On Sept. 20, 2023, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, through the Administration for Strategic Preparedness and Response, announced an investment of \$600 million across 12 domestic COVID-19 test manufacturers and the reopening of COVIDTests.gov to deliver COVID-19 tests for free to households across the country. These critical investments in U.S. manufacturing will improve preparedness for COVID-19 and other future pandemic threats, strengthen the nation's capacity to manufacture tests and secure approximately 200 million new over-the-counter COVID-19 tests for future federal government use.

In addition to the investments in domestic manufacturing, beginning Sept. 25, households will again be able to order four free tests through <u>COVIDTests.gov</u>. These tests will detect the <u>currently circulating COVID-19 variants</u>. People are encouraged to use the free tests as Americans prepare for travel and gatherings with friends and family throughout the 2023 holiday season.

In addition to inviting U.S. households to order four free COVID-19 tests, there are numerous other options to get tested for free, including <u>free community-based testing sites</u>, including pharmacies, across the country. ASPR also is distributing free at-home tests to schools, nursing homes, community health centers, rural health clinics, food banks and other community locations to ensure communities have widespread access to tests. The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services Office of Minority Health released a new <u>Z code</u> <u>infographic</u> to assist providers with understanding and using Z codes. Z codes are a set of International Classification of Diseases-10th Revision-Coding Manual codes used to report social, economic and environmental determinants known to affect health and health-related outcomes. Z codes can be used in any health setting and by any provider as a tool for identifying a range of issues related to education and literacy, employment, housing and more. --Karen Braman

Federal and National News

CMS to Publish Final Rules to Simplify Eligibility for Medicare Savings Plans

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services is <u>scheduled</u> to publish final rules this week simplifying processes for individuals to participate in Medicare Savings Plans.

CMS Releases New COVID-19 Vaccine CPT Codes

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services <u>released</u> the CPT codes for six new mRNA COVID-19 vaccines that became effective Sept. 11.

CMS Announces Lower Out-of-Pocket Prescription Drug Costs

The Inflation Reduction Act provided protections from high prescription drug costs for Medicare beneficiaries. The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services <u>released</u> a list of 34 prescription drugs for which Medicare Part B beneficiary coinsurance may be lower between Oct. 1 and Dec. 31, 2023. According to CMS, "Some people with Medicare who take these drugs may save between \$1 and \$618 per average dose."

CDC Foundation Announces Pregnant and Protected Campaign

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Foundation <u>announced</u> a new national <u>campaign</u>, *Pregnant and Protected*, to inform pregnant and postpartum people, and those considering pregnancy, of the significance of being up-to-date on their COVID-19 vaccination. Pregnant and postpartum people are at a higher risk for developing severe illness and complications because of COVID-19. Numerous studies have shown the COVID-19 vaccine is safe before, during and after pregnancy, and it protects pregnant and postpartum people, and their babies, from severe illness.

The CDC's COVID-19 vaccine <u>Interim Clinical Considerations</u> will be updated soon to align with the <u>approval</u> of the updated COVID-19 vaccine for all individuals over the age of six months. This update will include information related to pregnancy, lactation and fertility.
