CDC Recommends RSV Immunizations for Pregnant People, Infants and Older Adults

On Sept. 22, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention <u>recommended</u> the first respiratory syncytial virus vaccine for pregnant persons to protect their newborns from severe RSV. RSV is the leading cause of hospitalization for infants in the US. In clinical trials, Pfizer's bivalent RSVpreF vaccine (Abrysvo), was shown to reduce the risk of RSV hospitalization for babies by 57 percent in the first six months after birth. To maximize protection for babies after birth, the CDC recommends seasonal administration of one dose of RSV vaccine for pregnant people during weeks 32 through 36 of pregnancy.

Last month, the CDC <u>recommended a new RSV immunization</u> for infants, shown to reduce the risk of both RSV-related hospitalizations and health care visits in infants by nearly 80 percent. Most infants will likely only need protection from either the maternal RSV vaccine or infant immunization, but not both. However, for example, if a baby is born less than two weeks after maternal immunization, then a doctor may recommend the baby also receive the infant immunization. Only Abrysvo is approved for use in pregnant persons. GSK's RSV vaccine, Arexvy, is not approved for use in pregnant persons.

Both <u>Abrysvo and Arexvy are approved for use to prevent RSV in adults aged 60 years and older</u> with shared clinical decision-making. For more detailed information on Abrysvo's approval for use in pregnant persons, see the <u>FDA approval announcement</u> and the <u>Abrysvo prescribing</u> information.

The CDC is updating its <u>Recommendations for RSV Immunizations</u> to provide additional details. The Pediatric Pandemic Network compiled resources for the use of nirsevimab, including <u>FAQs</u> <u>for health care professionals</u> and a comprehensive <u>resource guide</u>.

Additionally, as we enter respiratory virus season, updated <u>COVID-19</u> and <u>influenza vaccines</u> are <u>recommended</u> for everyone ages six months and older. Adults ages 60 and older are recommended to also get an RSV vaccine.

Check out the American Hospital Association's <u>Community Health Assessment Toolkit</u>. This updated toolkit provides a nine-step guide for hospitals and health systems to collaborate with their communities and strategic partners to conduct a community health assessment and meet community health needs assessment requirements.

The toolkit was updated with input and guidance from a national panel of expert practitioners in community health assessment and collaboration. It reflects the understanding that while CHNA reporting may be required only for nonprofit hospitals and health systems, the CHA process is one that all hospitals can undertake. With a common commitment to health equity at the core, a well-executed CHA can be foundational to better health outcomes for individuals; stronger, more enduring relationships between hospitals and community groups; and healthier, more vibrant communities for all.

Federal and National News

CMS Announces Medicare Advantage and Medicare Part D 2024 Premiums

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services <u>announced</u> the average monthly plan premium for all Medicare Advantage plans is projected to increase from \$17.86 in 2023 to \$18.50 in 2024. CMS stated, "If enrollees choose to stay in their plan, most will experience little or no premium increase for next year, with nearly 73 percent of beneficiaries not seeing any premium increase at all." CMS credits the Inflation Reduction Act for keeping prescription drug costs lower for those with Medicare Part D coverage.

CMS also <u>announced</u> the calendar year 2024 participants in the Medicare Advantage Value-Based Insurance Design Model. The VBID model is designed to test a "broad array of MA health plan innovations designed to enhance the quality of care for MA enrollees." The number of participants has increased from 52 percent in 2023 to 69 percent in 2024.

CMS Issues Interpretive Guidance for Nurse Midwives

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services <u>issued interpretive guidance</u> for nurse midwives, which is part of the agency's efforts to improve maternal care by addressing workforce and access to care issues. CMS notes hospital regulations permit licensed practitioners, including nurse midwives or advanced practice registered nurses, as allowed by the state, to admit patients to a hospital. CMS does not require these practitioners be employed by, under the supervision of, or associated with an MD/DO, unless required by state law, regulations or facility policy. Additionally, a hospital is not precluded from credentialing and granting privileges to practitioners, such as nurse midwives, or from making them a part of the medical staff.

The guidance is somewhat different for Critical Access Hospitals. CMS states physician oversight is required for inpatients in a CAH, and the physician oversight requirement for outpatients is applicable if required by state law.

Agencies Propose Independent Dispute Resolution Process Fees

The Departments of Treasury, Labor and Health and Human Services <u>released</u> proposals to update sections of the No Surprises Act regulations. The rule would increase the administrative fee and the refundable certified independent dispute resolution entity fee. The administrative fee would increase from \$50 to \$150 beginning Jan. 1, 2024. The refundable IDR entity fee would be \$200 to \$840 for a single determination and a range of \$268 to \$1,173 for small-batch claim determinations.

MACPAC Studies Medicaid Managed Care Plan Denials

<u>Medicaid and Children's Health Insurance Program Payment and Access Commission</u> discussed the issue of managed care plan <u>prior authorization denials</u> in its <u>meeting</u> on Sept. 21. The commission is considering actions ranging from more robust reporting to requiring states to exercise specific oversight activities. It is expected to adopt recommendations as early as its meeting in November.
